## Request for Support – Closure of Golden Ball Lane

Dear Parents/Guardians and friends of PG.

We are asking for your urgent help relating to an important road safety issue that has only recently been brought to our attention. In short, the Council are actively considering permanently closing Golden Ball Lane to vehicle traffic. As you will be aware, Golden Ball Lane forms a crucial part of the PG one-way system that is place to keep your young people safe at drop-off and pick-up times, keep traffic moving as smoothly as possible and maintain the best possible relations with our neighbours.

The current proposal being considered by the Council is to close Golden Ball Lane via an "Experimental Order" which is expected to be in force for a minimum of 6 months, but could be up to 18 months at which point a permanent closure decision will be taken.

**Impact** - Without Golden Ball Lane being available there are no practical alternatives to maintain the current one-way system that we believe is absolutely essential to mitigate the risk of a young person being injured, or worse. Were the one-way system to be removed we unfortunately foresee:

- an increase in two-way traffic outside the Scout Hall, placing our young people at risk;
- long queues of vehicles on Furze Platt Road waiting to turn right into Winter Hill Road;
- vehicles cutting across the oncoming, fast-moving Winter Hill Road traffic to park next to the verge to allow young people to get in/out of vehicles safely;
- additional traffic delays on Winter Hill Road due to parking manoeuvres resulting from not being able to easily 'park at the back of the line' for drop-off/pick-up;
- the use of Malders Lane as an inappropriate turning circle or cut through to/from Canon Court Road area; and general disruption to our neighbours who show us great patience and tolerance already.

We do appreciate the Golden Ball Lane residents' concerns around volume of traffic, noise and safety. However, we believe that the safety risk, particularly to children, needs to be viewed holistically and consider the purpose of all road users of Golden Ball Lane. As always, the safety of everyone attending the Scout Hall is our primary concern and after a number of traffic incidents and very near misses over the years it is an issue we are passionate about, as we are sure you already know.

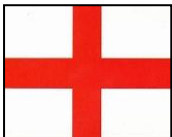


## **Emma Neeves 1973 - 2021**

## **St George's Day 2021**



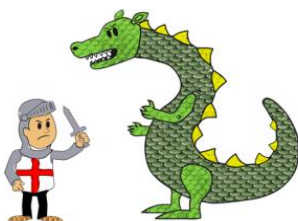

As we begin to think about returning to some normality, Raksha has started preparing our new joiners ready for investitures. We've got a lot of catching up to do: 16 to invest!

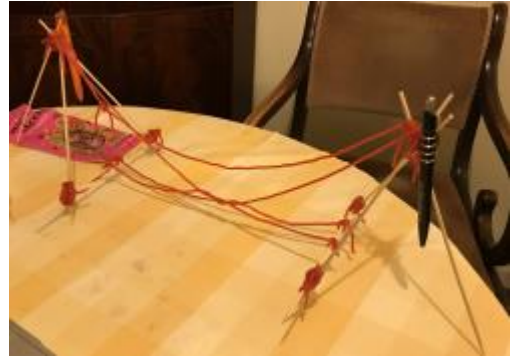

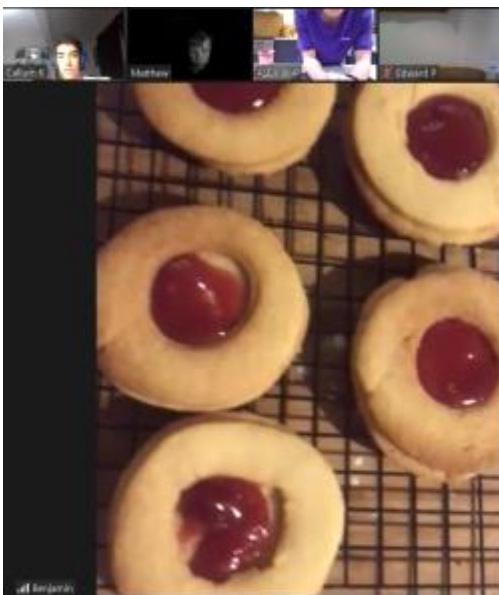
